GOOD NEWS from

FROM THE PASTOR ...

After Jesus had spoken these words, he went out with his disciples across the Kidron valley to a place where there was a garden... John 18:1

These words from the Gospel of John mark the beginning of John's version of the passion of Christ – those last few hours of Jesus' life spanning his arrest through his trials and finally his crucifixion. It differs from the other three Gospels in a few ways but the major details are all fairly consistent. Except one. Only John makes the point of saying Jesus' arrest took place in a garden where he went to pray following his last Passover meal with his disciples. Also, only John implies that the empty tomb of Easter morning is located in a garden. Matthew and Mark do not identify either the place of prayer at the beginning of the Passion or the location of Jesus' tomb as being in a garden. Luke too is equally vague. I find that very curious given the major role gardens play in our Easter celebrations. But that's something to ponder at another time. For today, I just want to say that I like that John has the Passion of Christ begin and end in a garden. I like the reminders of new life bursting forth around the empty tomb, just as it was when the world fell out from under Jesus' feet as he was

arrested. He had to have been afraid because he knew what would happen to him. But he did not surrender to that fear. He persevered through it and in so doing he brings us all to Easter morning. And it does matter that all this begins and ends in a garden – the very embodiment of new life always coming into being often times despite human intervention.

That's one thing we have learned in doing all the research underlying our Pollinator Garden project here at the church. God's creation - the beautiful world of nature all around us - really does not need our intervention in order to thrive and survive. It does not need lots of chemical pesticides that kill much more than weeds. It does not need perfectly manicured lawns and shrubs in order to burst with breath-taking beauty. It does not need tons of water when we plant what the local environment was destined to nurture in the way of plants and animals. BUT, God's spectacular Creation does need our protection, from unnecessary chemical interventions such as pesticides and fertilizers when natural alternatives work just as well, if not better. God's Creation does need our protection from air, water and soil pollution no matter how much more cost effective polluting may be for heavy industry. We must make the effort to note that a dead planet offers no employment for anyone.

All this is why I think our Pollinator Garden project has brought such a spark of new life to our already amazing church. This project is all about living into our role as care-takers of God's Creation in some ways that will feel new and strange as well as traditional ones we already know and love. I am so excited about this wonderful, innovative project which is bringing into sharper focus a whole new meaning of caring for the least of these - namely the bees and butterflies and tiny life forms more crucial to our own life cycle than we have ever realized before. God's sacred timing in all this is visible clearly in the reality that the first phase of our Pollinator Garden project will kick off on the first weekend of Eastertide, April 22 & 23. We will be celebrating Earth Day with the refreshing and renewal of the existing gardens of the church, a project we've already begun to publicize. I do hope you will find some time that weekend to come get your hands dirty as we reclaim the gift of God's Creation in our midst together. See the Earth Day weekend article elsewhere in this newsletter for details.

I also hope you've noticed the rainbow flags now flying in several places on our grounds and in the gardens. They symbolize our upcoming congregational vote after church on Sunday, April 9 to affirm the Open and Affirming statement drafted by our ONA Committee. This too is something I am hopeful you are aware of and we look forward to seeing you at the Forum to discuss the Statement on April 2 and the vote itself on April 9.

God's Spirit is truly alive and on the move here in this incredible church. And as always, no matter who you are or where you are on your journey of faith, you are welcome here. I'll be looking for you on Sunday!

The committee could appeal to the wider congregation for help if they cannot host a certain week. Ultimately, the deacons would be responsible for filling any gaps in scheduling.

There will be a Fellowship Hosts Committee sign-up next to the existing weekly sign-up sheet. The deacons will monitor the list and, at the end of April, consult with anyone who has signed up. Together, they will decide whether there are enough volunteers to fairly spread the responsibilities and make the committee feasible. If not, we will continue with the open sign-up system.
