FROM THE PASTOR ...

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy." Matthew 5:7

Mercy is a word we know in the sense that we're familiar with it, but usually in a vague, abstract kind of way. The dictionary on my office shelf defines the primary meaning of mercy as "more kindness than justice requires; kindness beyond what can be claimed or expected." (Thorndike Barnhart Desk Dictionary, 1953) The Bible Dictionary (The New Combined Bible Dictionary and Concordance, 2005) sitting just a few books away from the regular dictionary defines mercy simply as "kindness." In searching for bible verses containing the word mercy, they were more difficult to find than I had anticipated. I was working from a concordance written for the King James Bible and, as sometimes happens, the translation differences between a King James and an NRSV Bible can be substantial. Of the half dozen verses I looked up, only one was still translated as mercy in the NRSV. That's the one which appears above. All the others translated "mercy" as everything from "steadfastness" to "justice" to "love" to "kindness."

I'm going into detail on all this because I think the difference between the King James and the NRSV Bibles on the word "mercy" explains a lot about our contemporary ambivalence toward both the word and the concept it attempts to define. We just don't encounter the word "mercy" all that often anymore so we don't really stop to think about what it means. We see it perhaps in the names of hospitals or on Catholic schools, but it's not a word we use in everyday conversation with each other, and that's too bad. Whether you think of mercy in terms of love or justice or extraordinary kindness, it's something our world needs desperately and yet is in ever increasing short supply.

This is why I have identified the "Works of Mercy" as our focus for Lent this year. With ancient roots in the Christian tradition, the Works of Mercy are specific actions which when performed as a spiritual discipline assist you in understanding God's grace by experiencing it in living a Christian life through the practice of mercy. The Works of Mercy fall into two categories, physical and spiritual. Physical works are what you can do to alleviate suffering in another person. Spiritual works are what you can do to deepen your own faith or someone else's. There is a list of specific actions for each category and they are drawn from the Parable of the Nations in Matthew 25. A complete list of the Works of Mercy and suggestions for incorporating them into your life can be found in the Lenten Experience Guide available at the church. I will also be preaching on the Works of Mercy during Lent and would love to chat with you about your observations and questions about mercy during fellowship time each week.

Mercy – that experience of kindness beyond all measure and expectation – is something we all need at some point in our lives. And our fractured, broken and hurting world needs it desperately. No wonder Jesus included it in his wonderful litany of those things which bring us blessing, those beautiful and challenging words of the Beatitudes. "Blessed are the merciful for they shall receive mercy." This Lent, as we prepare for the miracle of Easter once more, let's explore together how mercy might hold the key for becoming the church God is calling us to be now and in the future.

MISSION TRIP 2016

A New Twist!



As many of you are aware, we have enjoyed two very successful congregational mission trips the last two summers based in "The Providence Experience" at Irons Homestead in northern Rhode Island. Our focus was to understand better the issues of homelessness and food insecurity right in our own area. These trips have been amazing offering unique opportunities to travel and learn together even as we deepened our relationships with God and each other. BUT, these wonderful experiences have been limited to a few people for any number of practical reasons.

In discussing this reality at its recent meeting, the Missions Committee came up with the wonderful idea of offering a Mission Trip experience to a broader audience through a variety of "day trip" opportunities over the course of the summer. Some of the ideas on the table for these day trips include:

- A return to the Abbey of Regina Laudis in Bethlehem, CT to experience firsthand the interweaving of the rhythms of daily life grounded in prayer and sustainable agriculture.
- A journey to Ground Zero in New York City as one way to understand how Muslim Christian relationships in this country have become what they are.
- A visit to a local Muslim Mosque to learn the truth of genuine Islam as a religion of peace and tolerance.
- A Sunday morning visit to the Friendship Breakfast at Mathewson Street Church in Providence to work and experience firsthand the reality of homelessness in our cities.
- A work day at one of the area farms which grows produce for the local food

- pantries to support those important efforts in tangible ways.
- A train trip to the Semitic Museum and others at Harvard University in Boston to see firsthand artifacts from the amazing history of our living faith.

These are just a few of the ideas we are considering. Do you have others? Which ones are you willing to help organize? Speak with Rev. Ruth or any member of the Missions Committee and let's all enjoy some wonderful "Mission Days" this summer!!
