FROM THE PASTOR ...

"The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how." Mark 4:26-27

Seeds are amazing, incredible, magical things. These little tiny specks contain within them the stuff of new life but yet we never notice them. At least I never thought much about them until recently. Thanks to the encouragement of our Pollinator Garden Committee and the wonderful array of seeds they secured for us for free from URI, I decided to take the plunge and try starting a few seeds myself this year. I've tried this a few times before with marginal success. Perhaps my hopes were too high or my attention span too limited. Whatever the reason, I grew seeds successfully only once before and planted the spindly marigolds in my front garden. They were positively pathetic mixed in amongst the bigger, bushier marigolds I had purchased at Home Depot but I hoped they would soon catch up to their professionally nurtured cousins. They didn't. Only one lived to see the end of the growing season and it never became as big as the Home Depot ones. But he hung in there and eventually produced bright yellow marigold blossoms as lovely as any.

You cannot imagine how proud I was of that spindly marigold. He was special because I knew him from when he was a seed. This year I have planted baby's breath and delphiniums. I have no expectations they will actually grow, but I hope they will. So far their progress is slow. But then just a few days ago, I could see tiny green shoots in the baby's breath tray! My hope is renewed once more that those tiny black specks I covered with dirt really do contain within them the life of those lovely little blossoms. Only time will tell.

I think this miraculous aspect of seeds that they grow from tiny specks into all sorts of wonderful plants - is why Jesus used them as a metaphor for how he understood God's kingdom. "The Kingdom of God is like a mustard seed, a tiny seed that grows into a mighty bush," he says. Then in the Parable of the Sower, Jesus explains that only a few of the seeds planted will actually grow to full size healthy plants. But that's okay, he explains, because when they're the right seeds growing the right plants in the right place, you only need a few to accomplish what God needs done. But today I was drawn to the above verse about seeds from Mark's Gospel. It is, I think, an accurate description of what the church is facing at this moment in the 21st century when so much of life is in flux for so many disparate reasons. The church is intended to be an example of the kingdom of God on earth and this verse makes clear that we really have no idea how to do that and yet we somehow trust that we can. That's why trying new things and doing things in different ways is an important part of figuring out how to be that shining example of the kingdom of God that is needed in our little corner of the world. Jesus is calling us to be seed scatterers and seed nurturers and we do that in many ways.

We scatter and nurture seeds of faith and trust in worship each Sunday as we explore God's message for us in word, song and prayer. We scatter and nurture seeds of help and hope through our many mission and service projects for our community and beyond. We scatter and nurture seeds through our many ministries of caring and support for each other with every card sent, every phone call made, every visit undertaken. All that we do as the people of God gathered together in our church comes down to being good sowers and growers of the seeds God gives us to nurture. Who and what they are may not be clear but that's okay because Jesus tells us not knowing is part of growing sometimes. Jesus reminds us that God is always in charge, not us. All we need to do is show up as best as we are able, ready to do what we can. Sounds like a plan to me. How about you?


