From the Pastor...

The Lord will guide you continually,
and satisfy your needs in parched places,
and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden,
like a spring of water whose waters never fail.
Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt;
you shall raise up the foundations of many generations;
you shall be called the repairer of the breach,
the restorer of streets to live in. — Isaiah 58: 11-12

These words from Isaiah are among my most favorite of many favorite biblical texts. They are credited to Isaiah and were written to offer hope and encouragement to the Israelites long captive in Babylon but now presented with the chance to return to their homeland and begin the arduous task of rebuilding their nation. The really amazing part of this text is that even though it was written sometime in the 6th century BCE, it still speaks to our human condition today just as powerfully now as it did then.

Think about it. We all know what it's like to feel parched and weary when life has asked too much of us. Challenges at work or in our families are exhausting and take a lot of energy. Our very souls can become parched from the stress of it all. We know what it's like to feel bone tired, wondering how we'll go on, especially when the task ahead, whatever it is, seems so daunting. It is at these precise moments when our own strength and desire to push ahead are lagging, Isaiah tells us, that we need to remember that God is right in the midst of things with exactly what we need to move forward. Like well watered gardens fed by unknown, unseen springs of water, we are restored once more by God's abiding presence in our midst. The only catch is that we have to remember God is part of it all in the first place. Instead of relying only on ourselves, we have to remember God is here with us in the midst of it all, sustaining and guiding us forward.

God is right here, right now! And because of that we can do anything we make up our minds to do. We can become the church so many of you envision us to be. We can rebuild new life for this community of faith and the green shoots of new growth are already visible. The Church Picnic is happening once more this Sunday and a new pictorial directory is underway. A new program for families and children called Family Fun Fridays launches later in September and excitement is high! Adult educational opportunities will begin soon including a Sunday morning series called "Bad Girls and Bad Boys of the Bible" with more educational offerings planned too. The exciting "Get Connected" Stewardship Campaign will begin in a few short weeks offering opportunities for me to meet with all of you in delightful small group gatherings to talk about how we make real our dreams for this church so that we are ready to raise up foundations of many generations right here.

So as September rolls around and our calendars fill up once more, I hope you will join me in claiming the roles Isaiah names as so important to who we are as members of God's Beloved Community, followers of the Risen Christ. May we all rejoice to be called repairers of the breach and restorers of streets to live in. God knows how much our world and our community need us to do just that. What about you?

Mission Memos

The UCC "Neighbors in Need" offering will be collected on October 7. This church-wide offering supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States, including the Council for American Indian Ministries. One third of the offering supports the established American Indian churches (of which there are twenty on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal congregation in Minneapolis, MN). Historically, the UCC has worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak people in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. It is good to know that these American Indians all choose, for moral and ethical reasons, not to include gaming on their reservations. Two-thirds of the offering goes to the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries, which performs strong policy advocate work on the national level for voting rights, the federal budget, civil liberties, and environmental issues, among other topics.

Your Mission Committee is working on balanced support of local, national, and global missions. You may be aware of our <u>local</u> support of the *WARM Center in Westerly* and the *Pawcatuck Neighborhood Center* in Pawcatuck. The UCC works <u>worldwide</u> through the Global Missions organization and our RIUCC specifically supports mission work in Haiti. At our church, we help farmers and artisans in less developed countries by selling Fair Trade food items and SERVV gifts at Christmas time. "Neighbors in Need" is one of our main <u>national</u> mission contributions; if you feel strongly moved to help the UCC's American Indian Ministries and to insure justice for all those within our own country, please heartily support this collection on October 7. You will find an offering envelope inside this *Beacon*.

In conjunction with the Christian Education Board and the children of the church, we *thank you* for all the generous donations of juice boxes and snacks for the Backpack initiative of the Pawcatuck Neighborhood Center (PNC). We hope to encourage and increase our monthly donations to the PNC by providing you monthly with a specific foodstuff that is especially needed by the community. For the month of September, if you are shopping and can purchase an extra or two and/or see a great sale, please

consider adding to your grocery cart: <u>instant mashed potatoes or instant rice</u>. Of course, any and all donations are so needed. There is a red bucket in Fellowship Hall and in the upper parking lot sanctuary foyer. <u>Every second Sunday</u>, the Mission Committee will place an in-worship collection basket on the chancel (near the altar), to help remind us to make food donations part of our monthly or weekly offering. Thank you again for all you do for others in need. Remember the words from Micah 6:8: "...what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

ICE CARD

Would you be interested in a UCC Westerly ICE card?

An ICE card is a wallet size "In Case of Emergency" card which you would keep in your wallet with your medical cards. It provides official written permission, with your signature, for the hospital to call Pastor Ruth if you are admitted to the hospital when you may be unable to give permission yourself. This is very important because the new federal HIPPA regulations forbid the hospital from contacting anyone about you without your permission. These cards would not replace your other emergency contact arrangements with family members. It just gives the hospital permission to notify Pastor Ruth you have been admitted. Blank ICE cards are available on the table outside the sanctuary door which leads to Fellowship Hall. Please speak with Pastor Ruth with any questions you may have about the ICE card.
