From the Pastor...

"That one is like a man building a house, who dug deeply and laid the foundation on rock; when a flood arose, the river burst against that house but could not shake it, because it had been well built." Luke 6:48

Good grief, what a winter this has been for us in our little corner of the world. And not just winter! Our struggles with the elements go back to the fall when Hurricane Sandy turned things upside down. When I heard the forecast for yet another weekend storm coming our way I admit it. I was annoyed. Actually, I was more than annoyed. I was angry. "Come on, God, how much of this disruption to the life and work of this church do we have to take?" I thought. "Let this one skip us, God" I prayed silently as a few of us gathered in the sanctuary for the Lenten midweek prayer service. Then this morning, as the sun streamed in through my kitchen window and the puffy clouds floated by in the crystal blue sky, I prayed to God for forgiveness for the anger of yesterday. Then I prayed to God for insight into what wisdom can be gleaned from the ridiculous weather of recent weeks and months. As I pondered, I realized that all these experiences and how we responded to them are real life examples of the rock on which our church, our congregation, is built.

First, I realized anew, and perhaps many of you have too, how really central Sunday morning worship is to the life of our community. Meeting together for that hour on Sunday morning to reconnect intentionally with God and each other truly provides the structure and foundation for our life together as church. We need the worship hour to pray together, to hear and reflect on Scripture together, to sing together and to sit in silence together. We need to be refreshed at the well of living water that worship offers us each week and this living water is not just about a good sermon or a beautiful anthem from the choir, although those things do add to our worship experience. The living water of worship is the refreshing energy we get just by the act of intentionally coming together in a sacred place dedicated to God, permeated with decades of prayers of all sorts and the life experiences of this community.

Second, I am reminded once again that we are the little church that just keeps going and going no matter what life throws in our path. The latest proof of this is that the Valentine Tea happened in spite of two back to back weekend snow storms, one of which was a full scale blizzard. The intrepid Tea leaders and workers just regrouped after the first delay and refused to surrender to the whims of the second storm so the Tea came off successfully with a slightly smaller crowd but really wonderful energy. I especially enjoyed visiting with a table filled with two young mothers and their daughters. They had never been to the Tea before and loved it, promising to make it an annual event for themselves. If we had surrendered to the second storm, those two families would have missed something special. But we didn't give in. And that made all the difference.

Third, in the aftermath of all these weather concerns, I witnessed once more how genuinely you care about and for one another. I know from conversations with many of you that you went out of your way to make sure others in the church were okay. And we are now engaged in the process of developing some sort of church "buddy system" to provide a little more structure to what is already happening here organically. This is the *koinonia* community that is described in the book of Acts. This is what Jesus tells us discipleship is all about – loving God with all that we have and all that we are and loving each other as ourselves. That's us, folks. And I am so grateful to be your pastor.

So as we head into March, the entire month of which is dedicated this year to our preparations for Holy Week and Easter, I hope you will find the time to come to worship on Sundays and perhaps one or two Wednesday evenings as well. I know you will find refreshment and renewal there. I hope you will support all the activities and events the church is sponsoring this month which are described elsewhere in the newsletter because these are the building blocks of our community. I hope you will continue to pray for and love one another, because that's what we do as followers of Jesus.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance

Karen Meara has told us about the IRS Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program and the Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) Program. They offer FREE tax help for taxpayers who qualify. The VITA Program generally offers free tax help to people who make \$51,000 or less and need assistance in preparing their own tax returns. IRS-certified volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing to qualified individuals in local communities. They can inform taxpayers about special tax credits for which they may qualify such as Earned Income Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, and Credit for the Elderly or the Disabled. The VITA site in Westerly is at the Warm Shelter Office at the corner of Granite St., across from Wilcox Park. Please call 401-596-1167 to make an appointment. To prevent identity theft you will be required to bring the social security card of anyone you will be including on your taxes.
