FROM THE PASTOR

And when you turn to the right or when you turn to the left, your ears shall hear a voice behind you saying, "This is the way, walk in it." Isaiah 30:21

This verse from the Old Testament will forever have a unique connection to this church after last Saturday's installation of our labyrinth. That's because this verse, written on an index card, was buried at the heart of the labyrinth along with a butterfly rainbow magnet. The Pollinator Garden folks had long been debating what we should bury at the center of the labyrinth since doing so is a part of labyrinth traditions going back to the Middle Ages. A St. Francis of Assisi medal was the only idea to surface at all but that didn't seem guite right. Then, as I was rushing out of my office one day, my eyes fell on the old rainbow butterfly magnet I had on one of the shelves. It was a gift to me decades ago from my mom. Butterflies have always been special to me, and this one especially so as the significance of the rainbow design it bears came to mean so much.

"Of course!" I said to myself when I noticed it once again! Perfect! Then, the morning of the installation, as I was saying my prayers in the predawn dark, I came across this verse which is part of my daily discipline. And I knew, it had to be with the rainbow butterfly at the heart of our labyrinth. Not only does it describe how one proceeds through the labyrinth, turning right and left as you make your way through, but it also captures so beautifully the essence of the labyrinth experience itself where you practice emptying your mind so that you are better able to hear God's voice in your heart.

I also think this verse has much to say to us as we move into the completion of our annual Stewardship Campaign on November 4. The Trustees will begin their work of creating the church's budget for 2019 in November and December, based in large part on those very same pledges. That's why your pledges matter so much. Without them, this church cannot continue the vital work it does in this community. Work like showing up at the Love Is Love Rally in Westerly on October 21, a community response to an unkind sign which appeared briefly on the lawn of the Immaculate Conception Church earlier in October. Work like our WARM Center meals and activities supporting those in our community most in need of food and shelter. Work like the twelve step groups that meet each week in our building. And the list of what we do as a church, as a community of God's people in this place, goes on and on.

So, as you turn to the right and to the left, making your way through life each day, I hope you will pause to think about this church – what it means to you, what it means to the community, and what wonderful things we are doing and will do in the years ahead. I hope you will bring your pledge card to church on November 4 as we celebrate the end of our Stewardship Season and All Saints Sunday. I even dare to hope that pledge card represents a challenge for you, even if it's a tiny one, so that you have just a bit of trepidation when you put it in the plate. And as you do, imagine God's voice saying to you in that moment – "this is the way, walk in it." We'll be looking for you on Sunday!





Bricks were donated to us by Jim Nieuwenhuis from Stonington Gardens and mulch was donated by William Spicer of Sparkle Lake Services. We even had a neighbor come up to us the day we were working offering a "pile of cinder blocks" if we were willing to come get them. We were! And of course, huge thanks to our incredible designer, Kathy Tarasuk, and our fearless volunteers who worked hard all day: Gary Davis, Sandi Davis, Shirin Platt, Lynn Murray, Ed Stratton, Kathy Tarasuk, Fred Tarasuk, Adam Tarasuk, Vera Leming, Bill Stirtan, Jenny Brummund, Christina Brummund, Claire Calabretta, and me. 
We can truly attest after this ambitious project that many hands do, in fact, make light work!!! Some additional work remains to finish off the labyrinth including leveling the ground around it, creating a pathway into it and continuing the construction of a retaining wall where the labyrinth abuts the stone wall at the top of the property. We will also be creating some flyers explaining the labyrinth and its purpose to have available for members, friends and visitors.

The first official Labyrinth Event will be on Wednesday, **October 31** with a **Flashlight Labyrinth Walk** on All Hallo's Eve (Halloween) **@ 6:30 pm**. Join us for a chance to recapture a more ancient feel for this creepy holiday...

Additional work remains for the Pollinator Garden Committee before winter moves us indoors for planning activities. We were able to complete the partial reseeding of a small corner of the meadow while the labyrinth design was being drawn on the 20th. Remaining outside work to be done includes weeding the Bell Courtyard and Shadow Gardens. Our planning work will focus on replanting the Rain Garden (decimated by some very happy groundhog and bunny families living on the grounds) and creating the design and installation plan for the Peace Pole Garden to be installed next spring.

"... 46 million Americans rely on food pantries and soup kitchens . . . to survive! That's 1 in 7 of our nation's citizens who need assistance to ensure they eat three meals a day.

People who are food insecure often do not have healthy diets. In many low-income areas, grocery stores are not readily accessible and fresh produce is too expensive. So their diets are often made up of readily available convenience store and fast food fare, which can lead to obesity, as well as costly and debilitating diseases.

To make matters worse, most of the food we donate to food drives is GARBAGE. We offload the dusty cans from the back of our kitchen cabinets, items that we have chosen not to eat. The nonperishables we give are often laden with fat, salt, and sugar.

We need not spend more to donate healthy food. A can of tuna in water is the same cost as a can of tuna in oil — but it's much better for us. Whole wheat pasta is much healthier than sodium-packed Top Ramen. Swap sugary cereals for whole grains. Give the food you would feed *your* family.
