GOOD NEWS from United Congregational Church of Westerly, UCC in Pawcatuck, CT

"Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." I Peter 4:10

I saw this text come to life this week as I watched so many of you pitch in to create our Christmas Bazaar, making dreams and plans into reality. Folks have worked feverishly on everything from typing up Silent Auction item descriptions to making centerpieces for the Tea to baking yet more cookies, to pricing jewelry, to ... well, you get the idea. Anyone who has ever helped with the Bazaar knows that an incredible amount of work is involved. I have no clue how one would begin to calculate the hours involved since so much of it happens outside of the church. The Bazaar takes shape in people's homes, at the sales in local stores, at yard sales, and in backyards with robust evergreens. Love is what keeps you going – to yard sale after yard sale, to clip evergreens in snowstorms, to bake more cookies in one day than some professional bakeries. Love is what polishes and mends the jewelry, lovingly unpacks and displays the antique linens and knick-knacks in the Nostalgia Boutique, creates unique gift baskets for every price range, endlessly makes more buckeyes or macarons, glue-guns the beautiful decorations on yet another wreath, tirelessly decorates little trees and centerpieces of all sizes. That can only be love in the flesh, the central meaning of the Christ Child's birth.

Each year the Bazaar crowds seem bigger. People start calling the church in October to confirm the date of the Bazaar, that's how much it means to people. That's how I know it's a ministry of love from our church to the community. At our Bazaar, gift giving becomes possible for folks without a lot of money. And all because this church – all of you – embody love in everything you do. In so doing you live your faith every day, usually without realizing it.

That, dear ones, is what it means to keep Christmas in your hearts. You teach me every year that the Christ Child is coming again, filling us and our community with the Hope, Peace, Joy and Love of Christmas. This is you, at your very best. Thank you for being you and loving God and our church as you do.

Trustee Notes

We want to thank everyone for keeping up with pledged donations. Pledge donations through October were \$61,747, about \$5,670 more than expected. Our total income through October was \$91,535, about \$3,410 less than anticipated. Total income was boosted by our annual contribution of \$11,000 from the housing fund. The areas where the income is significantly down are:

- Gifts to the Church: \$1.550 versus expected \$4,583
- Loose Offerings: \$770 versus expected \$1,875
- Special Projects: \$4,566 versus expected \$11,667 (normally made up by the Christmas Bazaar)

Our total expenses through October were \$98,695 bringing our deficit to \$7,160. Our utility electric costs are starting to show signs of being on closer to our budgeted amount. Trustees voted to contract with Coast and Country for snow plowing services this winter.

Our endowment fund is healthy; approximately \$6,000 of the interest generated by this fund is used as income to our yearly budget. Anyone interested in making donations to the endowment should see any of the Trustees.

The next Trustee meeting will be 17 December at 6 PM.

<u>MISSION MOMENTS</u> Operation Survival: Fill the Mission Christmas Tree



Buying "shares" in our hive project worked so well (we actually funded 23 hives through Heifer International) that we are continuing that process for our Holiday Mission Project. In the past we have sponsored three projects during the holidays. We realize that that is asking way too much of our congregation and that we are spreading all of us way too thin. This year, we are limiting our project to just ONE drive that will benefit the area homeless, the people who need our help the most.

Homelessness is not something that we, as a congregation, can solve. However, we CAN educate, contribute, and do our best to help our local homeless population survive the cold winter months ahead.

This year we are pairing with WARM and creating Operation Survival that will also serve

to decorate our Mission Christmas Tree. According to the officials at WARM, the three most needed items for our local homeless population are tents and large tarps to provide shelter from the elements, and bike locks to prevent theft of their personal much needed transportation.

We realize that these items can be pricey, so we will be selling "shares" of these items in November and December. A \$10.00 donation will earn you a colored ornament that you can place on the Mission Tree, which is traditionally in the front narthex.

Each \$10.00 donation will buy:

An entire bike lock! Or $\frac{1}{4}$ share of a tarp, or 1/5 share of a tent

Want to buy an entire tent? You will be able to place 5 ornaments on our tree! You may specify what you'd like your donation to support, or just put it wherever the need is the greatest. AND, YOU don't have to do any shopping!!!

Celebrate Nature's Glory Throughout the Year

In case you míssed thís great artícle last month, we're including it again this month!!!

If you are wondering why the Pollinator Committee has not "tidied up" around our pollinator meadow and garden beds, it's because we are letting "nature have her perfect work."

In traditional gardening we've been taught to tidy up our gardens and lawns at the end of the growing season. Some of us are obsessed with orderliness - perhaps in this crazy world in which we live it helps to have at least our home grounds feel more "under our control." Many of us who are property owners or caretakers spend a huge amount of time and energy "deadheading" (trimming off spent flowers) and raking up leaves and throwing them away, or blowing them out of our sight or at least off our curb. Consider this: the flora and fauna of our region have co-evolved through the centuries. Spent flowers - especially those of native flowers and shrubs - are a critical winter food source for the many species of birds who overwinter here in New England. Seed heads left standing are like tiny neon restaurant signs announcing good eats for our beloved cardinals, chicadees, nuthatches, finches, even bluebirds. While it is beneficial to set up feeders for these birds, it is even better to let nature do the feeding for us!

Leaves left on the ground, or leaf litter, is winter habitat for butterflies, moths, and other beneficial insects in early developmental stages. When you rake up your leaves you are literally raking up next summer's pollinators! Over time leaves that are left in place become "black gold" - a natural lawn fertilizer and high quality compost. That's right, the same compost and fertilizer we will pay exorbitant prices for in the store next spring!

So next time you pull out the rake or the pruning shears let nature be your guide! And this winter, we challenge you to stop for a moment on your way to church or in between errands. Look for the beauty of the winter garden: notice how the frost or snow settles on the remaining seed heads and stems of grasses. Take a moment to study nature in all her intricate beauty, even (especially) in the dead of winter!
