## **Points for Reflection**

Welcome to my Fall Sermon Series on hymns and how they inform and deepen our faith. Each week, you are invited to read through the week's focus scripture and reflect on some questions intended to guide your thoughts on that text. Then, you will be invited to consider how the biblical text connects with the hymn's verses.

This week's text: Luke 6:27-36 (see below)
□ This text is taken from Jesus "Sermon the Plain" in Luke's Gospel. What does Jesus say here about the Kingdom of God on earth?
□ This is the text where Jesus is quite clear in saying we are to love our enemies. How does he suggest we do this?
□ Jesus reminds us that God is "kind to the ungrateful and the wicked." How is this difficult for you to hear? How does this inspire you?
□ How does this text describe how following Jesus' teachings here will make us vital parts of God's "mighty fortress"?
□ Which line of the hymn do you think captures the essence of this biblical text?

# Luke 6:27-36

'But I say to you that listen, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you.

'If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.
