"How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings..." Luke 13:14b

Every Sunday when I am driving to our church for worship, I look forward to my short little excursion on Route 49 just as I exit 95. I'm only on it for 2 miles or so, but there are two houses I pass by where I sometimes get to glimpse a flock of hens clucking and scratching, a gorgeous rooster carefully keeping guard. I don't always see them, especially not in the winter months. But, lately, I've seen them more often than not and they always bring a smile to my face. I don't really know why. I'm a city girl, as you all know, which means I know absolutely nothing about taking care of chickens. I love the sounds they make and the way they strut around whatever yard they have decided to explore. I love how the wary rooster keeps a careful eye, for what I'm not sure. Is he worried one will wander off, trying to find out the answer to the timeless question, "why did the chicken cross the road?" Or is he keeping a watchful eye for their owner, ready to herd his feathery charges back home. I don't have a clue. But I know they still make me smile.

Jesus apparently liked chickens too and was more familiar than me with how they lived their lives. In this text from Luke, Jesus draws an analogy between the way a mother hen keeps track of her chicks and the way he has

attempted to gather up all of God's people into his arms. He is lamenting that far too few have wanted to find the kind of shelter of God's love he was offering them in his preaching, teaching and healing. I like this text and not just because it's about chickens. I like it because it shows what a realist Jesus is. He knows all that he has done and he knows that while many people follow him because they want to be healed or relieved of some other burden, not very many understood this new way of understanding God that was his unique ministry. At this point in time, Jesus was well aware of who his friends were, and who his enemies were. He also knew that his time to do God's work would not be without an end.

This year during the season of Eastertide, the time between Easter and Pentecost, we will be exploring the Jesus that had these crowds so enthralled. We will be taking a look at some of the many miracles of Jesus – the very same miracles that brought people to him in throngs in search of their own miracles. Jesus loved these people, God's people, but he knew all too well that while they loved the miracles, they still didn't really understand him or why God had sent them into their midst, miracles and all. Jesus' miracles fall into several categories - Nourishing people, casting out evil spirits, healing of bodily infirmity, controlling nature and the biggest miracle of all – resurrection of others as well as himself. As we explore these stories, we'll also be considering how these miracles can help us find our own way forward as we emerge from this past pandemic year. How do we need to be healed spiritually as well as physically? How is God active in guiding us forward, no matter what external conditions we encounter? Are we open to our own Jesus miracle, to allowing Jesus to comfort us as a mother hen comforts her chicks, or not?

So, dear ones, welcome to Eastertide. I hope you will come along with me as we continue on this miraculous journey of faith.

Trustee Notes

Trustee Notes

Due to the ongoing Covid 19 Virus pandemic; in person Sunday morning worship in the sanctuary has been suspended. Rev. Ruth has been live streaming our worship service from the sanctuary via Facebook. There is a plan in place to restart in person worship on Easter, April 4. During the week the church facility is open for administrative purposes only. This means that only employees and others conducting church business (financial and maintenance) are allowed in the building. No visitors are allowed in the building. If you do have a need to enter the facility, please remember to sign in and out on the forms at each entrance and to use the hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes.

As of the end of February we had received \$13,488 in pledges, \$3,398 more than the anticipated amount of \$10,190. Our total income through February was \$19,919. \$3,321 more than the budgeted amount of \$16,598. Our total expenses through February were \$21,195, \$1,660 more than the budgeted amount of \$19,535. Primarily due to the quarterly payments made in January for insurance and benefits. Also, our gas usage was higher than anticipated due to an efficiency with the boiler that supplies heat to the sanctuary. We ended February with a deficit of \$1,276.

Repairs were made to the boiler that supplies heat to the Sanctuary.

The Trustees have selected Clinton Glass LLC for replacement of the Cross Windows panes. The cost of \$4,250 will be covered by a generous donation by Bill Morrone in the Memory of Becky Morrone. Work should start within the next several weeks,

The Trustees have contracted with Roofing and Home Solutions to re-shingle the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall roofs. for the work. Work began on March 25th and has already been completed.

The next Trustee meeting will be on April 29.



Spring Earth Day Clean Up

The Trustees are extending an invitation to all to help clean up the grounds around the church after Worship service on April 18.

Those attending Worship that Sunday can wear their work clothes and be prepared to spend a few hours

raking leaves, picking up branches and trash, pruning shrubs and trees, and maybe even a little outside painting. Those not attending Worship that Sunday are welcome to stop by around 11:00 to lend a hand.

Please bring any tools, pruners, leaf blowers, etc. that you may have. We have several yard rakes and long handled loppers. The church will also supply paint and brushes but feel free to bring your favorite paint brush.

The Trustees will have a detailed list of jobs on that day and volunteers can select which chores they wish to tackle.



From the Financial Secretary

Greetings to all... Here are a few notes for 2021.

Please continue to use the same Pledge Number (found on the upper right corner of pledge envelopes) for the new year. You can place that number in the Memo line of your check. Do not worry if you do not know your number or if you pledge electronically. We can look up your number/name very easily. If you usually use pledge envelopes, please know that we will hold these at church until such time that we can worship together again. Perhaps making a note on your calendar each time you send in a contribution will help you keep pledges relatively current.

The Assistant Financial Secretaries, Ed Stratton and Bill Street will continue to "process and categorize" the pledges and other monies that come into church and then make a deposit about every two weeks or so. I will then go in and record the pledges on the computer for your statements. Know that there could be delays between when you send in checks and when they are deposited.

GARDEN CLEAN-UP FROM A POLLINATOR'S PERSPECTIVE! By Claire Calabretta from UCC Westerly's Pollinator Gardens Team

Are you tired of social distancing? Experiencing the symptoms of spring fever? Dreaming of the day we can once again be social, active, and blissfully normal? What better way to get on with life as we knew it, than to find joy in satisfying, physically demanding tasks like raking leaves and tidying up garden beds. It is only human to want to restore order to our gardens and grounds, which to our human eyes have begun to look brown and "spent." But the winter garden is actually teeming with insect life! The Xerces Society, an organization devoted to invertebrate conservation, encourages gardeners to consider the nesting and overwintering habitat of pollinators and beneficial insects, especially at this time of year. Here are a few of their garden clean-up recommendations, most of which run counter to traditional gardening practices:

1. Hold That Rake, Rest That Trowel, Leave the Leaves! Ideally, gardeners should wait to begin clean up until the daytime temperatures are consistently above 50 degrees F for at least a week. Butterflies, pollinators, and other beneficial insect friends spend the winter hunkered down in plant stems and leaf litter, either as eggs, pupae, or adults. In early spring, many insects are still in "diapause," a hibernation-like state. Garden clean up should be timed so that it does not disturb them before they have a chance to emerge. It is ideal to let leaves lie where they fall in autumn. If leaves must be removed in spring, make sure you wait until late spring to increase chances of emergence of butterflies and other insects.

2. Save the Stems!

Birds and other wildlife feed on the seeds of plants and grasses. (ok, admittedly we did not have much energy after a record four Bazaars last fall ... but we still earn gold stars for our efforts to NOT clean up at year end!). Begin pruning dead flower stalks in early spring to create nest sites for bees. When pruning, make cuts at a variety of heights from 8 - 24" above the ground. Cuttings can be placed loosely in a mulch pile, or even tied up in bundles with jute and hung from a fence or leaned against a stone wall or tree. The insects sheltering inside will emerge when they are ready, or other insects will move in and use the stems as "brood chambers." (It would also give us the chance for a citizen science project, watching for insect activity up close!)

3. Avoid Mulching Too Soon (if at all!)

Covering the ground with a layer of mulch too early in spring may block the emergency of beneficial insects and pollinators who overwinter in soil either as eggs, pupae or adult. Once again, wait until the weather warms and the soil dries out. Xerces Society recommends avoiding landscaping with plastic mulch, landscape fabric, and heavy wood chips, as these can limit nesting sites for ground nesting bees. A little groundcover goes a long way.

4. Prune with Care

When pruning back woody perennials or shrubs, keep a watchful eye out for cocoons and chrysalises of moths and butterflies. Allow these branches to stay intact until later in the season.

5. Install a Pollinator Habitat sign

Our church is planning to do just that this year! Stay tuned for more details!


