The Beacon May 2021



"Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" Mark 4:40

Jesus spoke these words to the disciples as one of the miracle stories Mark records in his Gospel is coming to an end. He and the disciples were crossing over a lake after a long day of preaching, teaching and healing. Jesus was exhausted and promptly fell sound asleep in the bottom of the boat. Meanwhile, a terrific storm blew up, getting worse and worse by the minute. The wind was roaring and the waves were washing into the boat and still Jesus slept. Finally, the disciples decided they had to wake him up since the storm hadn't. "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" they shrieked at him. Seems a little harsh but the disciples were in full panic mode so what can you expect.

Finally, Jesus woke up, rebuked the wind and waves and the sea calmed as the storm withdrew. Then he looked them right in the eyes and asked: "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" This is a legitimate question as the disciples had been with Jesus for a long time. They had seen lots and lots of miracles. They had seen lives changed and hearts transformed. They had heard Jesus tell them over and over again how precious they were to God, how with God all things are possible. Still, they were terrified in the middle of a storm they never saw coming.

We get that. We get what it is to be terrified by something so unexpected, so dangerous and so completely beyond our control. We get it because we have just survived Covid 19 and the havoc it created. We know what it is to be frightened by a force of nature coming out of nowhere and changing everything. We know how scary it is to hear the infection rates climb and the death toll mount as the news grows more and more dire. And if we forget, all we need to do is look at the news coming out of India right now. But then the vaccines started becoming available. And people became more vigilant about hand washing and mask wearing and staying physically distant from folks, weird and upsetting as that was – especially with folks we know and love, like our church family.

Now we find ourselves with Covid receding and we're trying to figure out what that means in practical ways. When is it safe not to be masked, to hug someone outside of our "household," to sing in church? When will the fear we have lived with for so long finally leave us in peace? That, dear ones, is probably the most difficult and long lasting of all the questions the pandemic has left us with. When will our fear – of an invisible and potentially deadly virus, of people denying that same virus even exists, of life just being so totally different - ever go away? When will we be able to live in peace as we did before we ever even heard of Covid 19? Probably never because the change the world has experienced because of Covid, has become part of us, and our church.

Dear ones, I believe that is a good thing. I believe that God is at work even here. That's why our question is no longer "when will things be as they were?" Instead, our questions need to center on what have we learned from all this and how we can emerge stronger and more resilient. That's what Jesus was getting at in his questions to the disciples as a little dingy emerged from a storm. "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" Dear ones, let us answer boldly and bravely, "Yes, Jesus, we do have faith! And our faith is leading us forward beyond fear and worry, making us whole!"

CROSS WINDOW HELP!

Our beautiful cross window needs your financial help. Three of the four panes were found to be cracked and replacement panes were purchased from Clinton

Glass. Unfortunately, when they removed the old glass, it was found that the exterior wood framing of the windows was so rotted that it was structurally unsound to install the new panes. This means that the framing needs to not only be replaced but needs to be beefed up in order to meet a 25-pound wind load. Clinton glass has proposed an aluminum framing that will meet the specification but it will cost an additional \$9000. Several other options are being explored at this time. One being possibly building up a wood frame that will do the job. We do not have an estimate yet of what that would cost.

The best answer is the aluminum framing since this would require minimal upkeep and maintenance. A wood frame would require regular maintenance and painting to keep it from deteriorating.

The Trustees are asking for donations to help cover the additional cost. Any donations should be marked for the Cross Window.

Trustee Notes

Sunday morning worship in the sanctuary has returned along with live streaming of the service from the sanctuary via Facebook. During the week the church facility is open for administrative purposes only. This means that only employees and others conducting church business (financial and maintenance) are allowed in the building. No visitors are allowed in the building.

If you do have a need to enter the facility, please remember to sign in and out on the forms at each entrance and to use the hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes.

As we end the first quarter of 2021, we are doing very well financially. At the end of March we had received \$22,195 in pledges, \$6,911 more than the anticipated amount of \$15,284. Our total income through March was \$50,439. \$25,542 more than the budgeted amount of \$24,897. This increased income was primarily due to the transfer of \$20,000 from the endowment fund to the general fund to pay for the re-shingling the

Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall roofs. Our total expenses through March were \$47,126, \$17,823 more than the budgeted amount of \$29,303. This increase in expenses was primarily due to the partial payment for the roof work (\$10,450). We ended March with a surplus of \$3,313.

A very successful Earth Day cleanup of the church property was held on April 18 following worship. The Trustees would like to thank everyone who participated in this annual cleanup of the property.

The Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall roofs have new shingles. There have been no signs of any leakage during the recent rain storms.

Clinton Glass started replacement of the Cross Window glass on April 26. Upon removing the old cracked glass and the trim, it was found that the wood framing had rotted so badly that it was structurally unsound. Repairs to the framing will have to be made prior to the new glass being installed. For the next several weeks the Cross window will be covered with a tarp. Alan Hill (Asael Hill's son) will be working with Clinton Glass to make repairs to the framing so that the new windows can be installed.

The next Trustee meeting will be on May 25.

THOUGHTS ON SUSTAINABLE GARDENING FROM OUR POLLINATORS TEAM!



TIPS TO CONSERVE WATER IN YOUR YARD AND GARDEN from the UCC Westerly Pollinator Team

Choose plants wisely. Plants native to our area are beneficial to wildlife and often eliminate or cut down on the need to water. Smaller, narrow-leaf plants generally need less water than large leaf plants. Intersperse these with drought resistant broad-leaf plants. Replace water-guzzling lawns with groups of pollinator plants.

Water at the right time of day. Water in-ground plants in early morning will lessen evaporation. However, container plants grow stronger and healthier if they are watered in the afternoon. Avoid watering in the evening because it may promote fungus diseases.

Water the right amount. Do not overwater. Use a water gauge and watch weather conditions so you only water when necessary. Instead of using oscillating sprinklers, try drip irrigation hoses. Soaker hoses distribute water to where it is needed and lessen water evaporation and runoff. Less frequent but deeper watering encourages plants to grow deeper roots.

See to your soil. Use mulch to retain moisture and keep weeds out. A 2-3 inch layer of coarse mulch is best to allow water to permeate the soil and avoid compaction.

Increase organic matter in the soil by adding compost made from leaves and vegetative food scraps.

Capture rainwater. Rain can be captured in buckets, barrels, tanks and stone cisterns. Top containers with a fine-screened lid to keep out mosquitos and other pests.

Slow water runoff. Keep rainwater in your yard with a Rain Garden, essentially a depression planted with water-tolerant plants (able to be wet for 24 hours or less). The Rain Garden at UCCW collects runoff and filters out pollutants allowing cleaner water to seep into the earth and aquifers. Rain Gardens enhance backyard habitats as they attract butterflies, birds and other beneficial visitors.

The Pollinator Gardens Team is ALWAYS looking for more folks who are interested in sustainable gardening practices. The best way to learn is by working alongside us! 
