

"... but this one thing I do; forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus." Philippians 3:13-14

As I write this, Election Day is underway. In some respects, it seemed like it would never get here, that we would be doomed to listen to the endless round of campaign rhetoric and the pundit analysis which have dominated our hearts and minds for what feels like years. In other ways, we are relieved that our uncertainty about the future will soon be clarified, one way or the other. I have no more insight than anyone else into how this quagmire of an election will turn out, but I do have a couple of thoughts for your prayerful consideration in this fraught moment.

First, I must say that I woke up already praying about the election finding myself repeating over and over again the famous prayer of Julian of Norwich. An anchoress, mystic and theologian who lived in England in the 14<sup>th</sup> century, Julian endured much during her lifetime. For one, the Black Death or plague as we think of it today, was rampant during her lifetime. At one point she herself became ill and thought she was dying. But she recovered and then experienced a series of visions depicting the Passion of Christ. Her writings consisted of descriptions of these visions. While she preferred to remain in seclusion (hence her decision to become an anchoress – a hermit walled into a small cell attached to a church), she still became well known during her own lifetime as a mystic and especially prayerful person. Julian never became a saint and not that much is known about her life before she became an anchoress, but she nonetheless was an inspiration to all who knew her. I came across her years ago when I was introduced to her most well-known prayer, a simple one and the one with me so powerfully this morning.

Julian's prayer was "and all will be well, and all will be well, and all manner of things will be well." This simple prayer is incredibly powerful, saying so much in a few simple words. I love that it starts with "and" emphasizing I think that we are always in the midst of life as it unfolds each day. I also love the supreme confidence in God's abiding presence as life unfolds – sometimes in ways we embrace, and other times in ways we fear. I love that she trusts completely that everything – all – will be well. Note she is not saying anything about how this will happen. She does not presume to state what it is God wills to have happen. She simply states that she has absolutely no doubt that whatever happens, it will be as God intends, even perhaps especially if we don't understand it. She trusts that God is firmly in the middle of everything that will transpire and is transpiring in the moment. This is a powerful faith and witness indeed, one that we need on such a day as this one surely is.

The anxiety and fear surrounding the outcome of this election is absolutely palpable in a way I have never experienced in my lifetime. That in itself is so difficult for us to accept, to wrap our heads around. Those of us who are old enough remember elections when there were stark differences between the platforms of both Presidential candidates, but we never had any sense of fearing the results. Looking back on some of those elections, we could say we probably should have been more afraid, more anxious to do everything we could to get everyone to vote. How different would the climate change crisis be if Al Gore had won? Would our collapsing infrastructure be in better shape if Ronald Reagan had not been so successful in branding government as wastefully and needlessly expensive? Maybe. But I don't think we ever experienced the existential fear so many of us bring into this day.

This is where Julian's prayer becomes so important as a means of calming our hearts and opening them up to God's leading, and we can also allow ourselves to be lifted up by these wise words from the Apostle Paul in his letter to the church in Philippi. He says to them, "forget all this stuff you've been worried about. Instead, push yourself forward into the future because that is where God's plan for you and for all of us is waiting."

Dear ones, rest assured that whomever wins this election – Kamala Harris with a message of hope or Donald Trip with a message of fear -- there will be much work for us to do. Now is the time to prepare and trust that, as Julian teaches us, "all manner of things will be well." Thanks be to God. We are not alone in whatever we will face as dawn comes on November 6.




