

"... and very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb." Mark 16:2

The story of the women's discovery of the empty tomb on Easter morning is, of course, the foundational story of Easter, and indeed all of Christianity. That almost goes without saying. What's really remarkable, though, is that the story is distinctly different in all four Gospels. The only commonalities among the four stories are that the tomb was empty and that the discovery was made by one or more of the women who were then charged with sharing this incredible news with the disciples. During our Easter celebrations populated with Easter bunnies, baby chicks, jelly beans, Easter Eggs and beautiful spring flowers, we just sort of gloss over this rather glaring situation. How is it that the most foundational story of the entire Christian faith can have so many differences in different accounts? It's fascinating, at least to me. Let's consider the differences, in the order the Gospels appear in the Bible.

In Matthew, Mary Magdalene and "the other Mary" go to the tomb at dawn to finish preparing the body for burial. As they arrived there was an earthquake as an angel descended from heaven and rolled away the stone from the tomb's entrance. The angel told them not to be afraid but to go and tell the disciples that he had been raised so they took off to find the disciples. On the way, they ran right into Jesus and they fell at his feet to worship him. He told them to get up and go tell the disciples he would meet them in Galilee and they took off.

In Mark, it's Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome (yes, that Salome from Herod's court) who went to the tomb at dawn to anoint the body. They had been worried about who would roll the stone away but when they got there it had already been moved. They went into the tomb and saw a "young man" dressed all in white who told

them not to be afraid. He told them that Jesus had been raised and was not there. He also told them to go and tell the disciples, but this time, they don't because they were too terrified. The text ends with them running away.

In Luke, it is Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James and "the other woman" who go to the tomb. The stone has been rolled away so they are able to go in. There they find "two men in dazzling clothes" who reminded them that Jesus had told them he would rise again and that's just what he had done. They were to go to the disciples and tell them what had happened which they did but the disciples, considering it "an idle tale" did not believe them.

In John, it was only Mary Magdalene who came to the tomb and found the stone rolled away. She went back to find the disciples. Peter and "the other disciple" ran back to the tomb and looked inside but only saw the grave cloths. Mary stayed outside weeping. Finally she looked into the tomb and saw two angels who asked her why she was weeping. She then turned around and saw Jesus but she did not recognize him. She thought he was the gardener so she asked him if he knew what had happened. At that point, Jesus called her by name, and she recognized him and tried to hug him. He did not permit her too but instead told her to go to the disciples and share the news of his resurrection which she did.

So, four different versions of the *same* story – THE Easter story for all Christians everywhere. Only in two does Jesus himself actually make an appearance! Yet, the essential elements are all the same in each account. What are those essential elements? The Empty Tomb awaiting the visit of Mary Magdalene who is clearly designated to be THE witness to the Resurrection. How amazing is that? So much to unpack here but for now let's just leave it at this – Jesus always chooses the most unlikely people to do the work that needs doing. Even you and me.

TRUSTEES NOTES

Pledges for February were \$4,618, \$1,364 less than the anticipated pledge amount of \$5,982. Total income for February was \$8,257. Total expenses for February were \$9,797.

The trustees have contracted with Northern Exteriors to replace the roof sheathing, siding and flashing over the sanctuary cat walk and organ pipe chest. The piping for the booster pump in the kitchen was replaced.






Prayer Tree
