

"Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and charity." - Acts 9:36

Whenever I read this particular text, it makes me remember the church of my growing up years in Pittsburgh, PA. Ours was a little Presbyterian Church and a staple of congregational life in it was the ladies "Circles." Our church had at least three. These Circles were basically a combination of prayer group, Bible study group and fellowship group for the ladies who belonged. A very popular name for these "ladies circles" was "Dorcas," a reference certainly to the Dorcas of the scripture text above.

Dorcas, as we meet her in this little story about one of the first healings done by Peter, was a much beloved local woman. She was devoted to God and to "The Way" of Jesus, known for "her good works and acts of charity." Honestly, this description of Dorcas would describe every woman in the little circle groups of my home church as it still describes the women of our little church right here in Pawcatuck, CT today. These women, devoted to "good works and acts of charity," are the backbone of every church. These are the ladies who make sure coffee is hot and fresh on Sunday mornings, switching to ice water and lemonade in the summer. These are the ladies who made Attic Treasures happen just last weekend, and they are the driving force behind the Bazaars and so much of the work this church does within and beyond our walls. It has always been thus in churches.

One reason for this was that early on women were largely excluded from professional ministry as a matter of course. They were often even excluded from leadership roles in the local church, just because they were women. I still vividly remember the very first woman who was elected an Elder in that little Presbyterian church. It happened when I was in 5th or 6th grade -- early 1960's. I remember because it was a big deal made plain by the fact that all the other ladies of the church were crying as Ruth Thornton received the laving on hands when she was installed as an Elder in the church. An Elder is sort of a cross between a Deacon and a Trustee in our church today. Anyhow, Mrs. Thornton was crying, getting tears all over her orchid corsage the other women had made (not

bought) for her. My mom was crying. Her friends were crying. I had no idea why and my mom never really explained it. All she could say in that moment was something like, "this is a really important position in the church and it's such an honor and great responsibility for her." I was young but I understood that well enough. What I didn't get was why it was such a big deal. Why wouldn't Mrs. Thornton get this position? She was wonderful and such a hard worker! Of course she should be an elder! Who could possibly think otherwise?

Only now do I realize what a huge, big deal this was. Only now do I fully appreciate Mrs. Thornton and Mrs. Waggoner, Mrs. Braymer and Mrs. Roth, Mrs. Lipps and Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Rizzo and Miss Gilson. And my own mother and grandmother of course. Extraordinary and ordinary women at the same time. Some of these ladies worked outside the home, sort of. They were "unofficial" and unpaid office managers for the family businesses run by their husbands. Others, like Mrs. Roth, worked in their own hard earned careers. She was my elementary school principal. My mother built her own career in retail management in local department stores and even my grandmother worked in her family's wholesale rose and floral business. These women, then and now, were my heroes – just like the extraordinary women of this church still are.

As Mother's Day is upon us once again, I find myself thinking about these women, only this time with an even deeper respect and gratitude for all they did, seemingly with no one really noticing at the time. Yes, it was a very big deal when Ruth Thornton became an Elder in that little church. It's still a big deal to me because I know she paved the path forward for me and every other woman like me who eventually pursued ordained ministry. Moments like Mrs. Thornton's elevation to Elder should still be a big deal, but sadly, these early women leaders have a way of slipping into anonymity. Younger women are only just now beginning to realize all that these women stood for, all they worked for, as these rights are being threatened by some seeking a return to what they see as "better days" of some imagined past.

That's why this Mother's Day; I invite you to pause and remember all the extraordinary women who were part of your growing up years. I know they were there and they deserve to be remembered and given all the thanks we have to offer, and so much more.



Prayer Tree


Our church has a very active and vital prayer ministry which
